






Poppies of Remembrance

Poppies of Remembrance is a commemorative quilt.

I love poppies so when I found a quilt kit of poppies, I just had to have it. Kits are wonderful -- no decisions to make, maybe, no fabric to buy, maybe, just open the package and sew, but it will be one of many quilts exactly the same. The pattern was designed by Pam Bono, a pattern designer from Colorado, USA, to honour Colonel John McCrae, his poem "In Flanders Fields"; and all troops, veterans, their families and friends all over the world.

The kit, which was purchased in 2008, included the instructions for cutting the fabric and sewing all 944 pieces back together again. Included was fabric for the top. Before work was actually started on the quilt, I had seen several completed quilts at various quilt shows. Each has a very bright yellow fabric which was not my favourite. So, I decided to replace it with a softer yellow colour. While purchasing this new fabric, the salesperson said that by replacing the original fabric the value of my quilt would be greatly decreased. Since I had taken away most of the value of the quilt by replacing this fabric, according to the salesperson, I changed the placement of the stems and added buds making the quilt totally worthless but uniquely mine. I was able to find some amazing fabric for the backing which has a field of wildflowers including poppies.

I actually sewed the quilt top together in 2011 (110 hours) and then it became a UFO (unfinished object) until 2015 when the 100th anniversary of the poem's creation was being celebrated. I decided that it had to be quilted by November 11th. And, it was. The quilting took 261 hours. This is one of my favourite quilts.

How to Grow in Faith – Part 4 of 5

Grow Your Faith by Trusting Him in the Storms

People can go through hard times and their faith doesn't grow at all. The winds and rain beat them down. But storms can strengthen and grow our faith when we lean on Jesus to comfort, guide, and protect us, and give us answers to our problems.

Hold tight to your faith, especially in the storms!

James encouraged the churches to "consider it pure joy" whenever we face trials because "you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance." James 1:1:2-3 NIV.

The joy is not "happiness", or pretending to be, but looking at what positives may come from the trial. Not one of us is immune to storms.

There are lessons to learn in every trial we go through. They can strengthen the unique aspects of our character. God walks through every trial by our side. Ask him for strength, patience, endurance, wisdom- whatever you need. He will help you grow your faith in the rough spots in life.

We water our grass, plants, and flowers through droughts. We cover up tender plants when frost is coming. Plants that get leggy and scraggly need to be pruned to produce a healthier plant. God cares for us the same way when we need watering (through the Holy Spirit), tending (loving us), and pruning (ouch!), and He always does it for a good purpose.

Pastor Mark's Musings

Dear friends,

I went to my bank recently. The young man I worked with had an interesting name so I asked him where he was originally from. He teasingly invited me to guess. I was wrong but not by too far. It turns out that he was born in Northern India, in the state of Gujarat, near the Pakistan border.

This interaction reminded me again of the cosmopolitan, multicultural society Canada has become. Certainly, in southern Ontario we have many people from many places coming together. And considering this variety of cultures I think we've done a pretty good job of creating a community that welcomes all. Not a perfect job by any means and we still have a long way to go for sure. But considering that there are few places like Canada in the world that have so many different peoples coming together we need to remember that this is truly a most unique human experiment going on right in front of us.

Last week there was a discussion paper on the Canadian Human Rights Commission (CHRC) website about religious intolerance in Canada. The paper claims that Canada is fundamentally a racist country built on a "settler colonial" mindset. This racist attitude spills over into religious tolerance. Is that a fair evaluation of the current Canadian mind set?

It is not that we haven't had our places of failure as a country or as a society. We could point to the Government of Canada and its attempt to assimilate First Nations peoples through education and religion. Or the Government of Canada turning away boatloads of German Jews fleeing Nazi Germany in the late 1930s. We could add the internment of Japanese Canadians in the early 1940s. In fact, if we wanted we could make a long list of racial and religious injustice brought about by various Canadian governments throughout our 150+ years of existence.

For me I see that history of injustice as a failure to live up to basic Canadian values that have been with us from the beginning. It is not that our values were or are fundamentally flawed but that we failed to live them out in practice. We missed the mark many times as a country and as a people. That doesn't mean that what Canada has been, is or is moving towards is wrong. Quite the opposite. The fact that we can recognize error in this regard is a sign that there is deeper truth at work in our society. This is something to be celebrated.

Canada has been a religiously diverse country from its founding. Canada found a way to reconcile Catholics and Protestants in one country. We shouldn't take that for granted. Europe fought over religion for centuries. Canada's first mosque was built in Alberta back in 1938. Canada's first Jewish synagogue was built in Montreal in 1768 and the first Sikh temple in 1908. In 1851, before Confederation, the Freedom of Worship Act was passed in Ontario and Quebec and it protected the "free exercise and enjoyment of religious profes-

sion and worship, without discrimination or preference." Interestingly, the discussion paper on the CHRC website failed to acknowledge this history.

The discussion paper claimed that the two statutory holidays based on Christmas and Easter (technically they should have mentioned Good Friday instead of Easter) are examples of systemic religious discrimination. But isn't today's Christmas holiday really more a legacy of Canada's Christian heritage than an example of current systemic religious intolerance? And a Leger poll from 2022 asked Canadians who grew up non-Christian whether they were offended by the greeting "Merry Christmas." Of respondents, 92 per cent said "no." That same poll also asked Canadians of all religions whether Christmas and other "religious" holidays should be struck from the country's official statutory holidays. Only six per cent said "yes." There is certainly strong support in the broad Canadian population for Christmas and this support undercuts any claim to systemic discrimination with respect to it.

Let's be frank. There are certain advantages or privileges that come with being part of the majority. That is undeniable. Every society today or which has ever existed in history gives certain benefits to the majority population. That is just life and I think most people understand this. What makes Canada unique is the degree to which the minority voice and perspective is included in the public square.

What does this all have to do with following Jesus? For one thing, Canadian values that we hold most dear come from the Christian faith. It is Christian values which undergird our society. Our respect for the dignity of the individual. Our embrace of diversity of human beings. The commitment to see all people as having worth. Our commitment to the principle of equal justice under the law. At their core these are Christian values and I am happy to live in a country that rests on Christian values. It turns out that there are lots of people from around the world that want to live in a country that rests on Christian values too.

I am glad that we changed the Holiday Market to the Christmas Market. I think it is important that churches claim their Christian heritage. I am glad to see that Christmas is no longer a dirty word in the public sphere. I think we should be bold in our presentation of our Christian ways to the world. We have a great story to tell. It is about how God became one of us and was born as an infant in a backward little town in a distant province of the old Roman Empire. It is a story that reminds us to see everyone as our brother and sister. It is a story that tells us again and again that we are not alone.
