

Guatemala Outreach Trip

On January 20, a group of ten volunteers, led by Valerie Thielking headed off to Guatemala. The group ranged in age from 8 to 84. We spent a total of eight days in a small community about three hours from Guatemala City. We were working with Rita and Geoff Doppenberg, their sons, Luke and Gabe and daughter-in law Kate. Much of our time was spent on "the mountain" which is about 20 kilometres or one hour from the place where we stayed. We would take two four wheel trucks and many of us would ride in the back. We visited homes of the Mayan people, natives of Guatemala. We installed a total of 25 smokeless stoves. The stoves greatly reduce the amount of wood required and are vented to the outside. Previously their source of heat was a fire built on the dirt floor. These stoves have proven to be a help in reducing respiratory illnesses. On the one day that we did not go to the mountain, we actually assembled the stoves. We also provided school supplies for the school that is operated at the compound as well as the blind school. Supplies were purchased in Guatemala to help their economy. We thank you for your financial support provided at the many fund raising events that were held during the year. We hope that we contributed in our small way to the great work that the Doppenbergs have been doing for years.

So, what does John Lennon, Alistair MacLeod and Pastor Mark Rutledge have in common? The answer in a word is love.

The Beatles released the song *All You Need Is Love in 1967* written by John Lennon, many of Mark's sermons are based on the same theme that Lennon put to music, and that MacLeod adopted in what is arguably his best book, *No Great Mischief* published in 1999.

No Great Mischief is a story about families and the ties that bind them. Mac-Leod picks up the story in 1779 when Calum MacDonald sets sail from the Highlands of Scotland and sets out for Cape Breton where the family settles in the land of trees. There the family grows and becomes almost a clan of its own.

The story is told through the eyes of Alexander MacDonald, who along with his

sister, was raised by his grandparents. They do well and Alexander goes on to become a successful orthodontist and his older brothers go to the mines and develop expertise specializing in shaft mining.

While Alexander becomes a success, life wasn't always easy for the MacDonalds as one generation after the next scraped out a living in the Cape Breton woods, a long way from the homeland in Scotland.


MacLeod guides readers through the family's past recollecting stories of loggers, miners, drinkers and adventurers.

The last line of the book reads: "All of us our better when we are loved". It is a line that appears throughout the book and the message is the same as one that Mark frequently sends from the pulpit.

No Great Mischief was ten years in the making and won a number of literary awards including the International Dublin Literary Award in 2001. It was, and continues to be, one of my personal favourites.

No Great Mischief is one of thousands of books available at the Stone Church Bookstore. The store is open Sunday from 12 to 2 p.m. Sunday and again from 5 to 6 p.m. Tuesday. Our store has an ever-changing book list. Readers should keep in mind that we are planning another big book bonanza sale March 23 and 24 when the theme will be Celebrating the Spirit as we prepare for Easter Celebrations.

Pastor Mark's Musings

Dear Friends,

Climate Change is in the news a lot these days. Part of the reason for this is because we deal with weather every day of the year and weather is a derivative of climate. So, in one sense, it is inescapable. There is no way to avoid it. With that being said, I notice that there is a tendency today to conflate one to the other and make weather and climate the same thing. I see news articles that extrapolate every major weather event back to climate change. But climate is not weather. Most climatologists study climate over decade, century or even millennia intervals. The reason for this is that there is immense variability in the weather and it would be easy to mistake this variation for longer term trends. In fact, this is probably the biggest challenge in climate research. Being able to extract out weather variability in order to observe the climate data that lays underneath it.

Earth has been slowly warming over the past 10,000 years since the last Ice Age and it is likely to continue warming for the next 20 or 30,000 years. This has to do with the Milankovitch (Orbital) Cycles that describe the variation in the Earth's orbit around the Sun. More specifically, Milankovitch studied three elements of Earth's journey around the Sun.

The shape of Earth's orbit, known as eccentricity; The angle Earth's axis is tilted with respect to Earth's orbital plane, known as obliquity; and the direction Earth's axis of rotation is pointed, known as precession.

It turns out that there is a small, but significant variation in the journey that the Earth takes around the Sun. The orbit changes slightly and Earth wobbles a bit as it moves. Who could have known? This variation, while small, can have a huge impact on climate and weather. How big? Well, 10,000 years ago Cambridge, Kitchener and Guelph were under a kilometer of ice.

Climate study has to take the Milankovitch Cycles into consideration as it attempts to understand how climate changes and evolves. There is another important consideration in current climate studies that is being seriously researched. How sensitive is the climate to Carbon Dioxide (CO2)? Or how big an impact does CO2 have on climate. Is the impact small or large? If the Climate has a low sensitivity to CO2 then it means that the Earth warms very slowly as CO2 levels increase. It means we don't really have a problem. If the Climate has a high sensitivity to CO2 then it means that the Earth warms very quickly as CO2 levels increase. That means we have a large problem. The consensus view today is that the climate sensitivity to CO2 is moderate which means that climate sensitivity isn't so low that CO2 levels should be ignored, but it's also not so high that there is no hope for the planet's recovery.

It is important to understand that in order to get the consensus view scientists had to narrow the range of estimates. The fact is there are plausible scenarios with respect to climate sensitivity to CO2 at both ends of the spectrum and we don't know which of the various scenarios, low, medium or high is the correct one. Remember, when people argue today about climate change it is usually an argument about climate sensitivity. That is the only major issue under discussion today with respect to climate.

I think the issues surrounding climate change point to a fundamental human dilemma. How do people deal with risk? How do people deal with uncertainty? We tend to have two distinct ways of responding to risk and uncertainty. There is a strong tendency in us, on the one hand, to procrastinate and deny it. On the other hand, there is a strong tendency in us to turn risk and uncertainty into catastrophe. This turns risk and uncertainty into an all or nothing proposition. No problem, huge problem. I recognize this pattern around me all the time. I can recognize this predilection at work in me and in others I love too. Sometimes we respond too quickly to situations and at other times we respond too slowly or not at all.

How do you deal with risk and uncertainty in life? And how, specifically, should a follower of Jesus Christ deal with risk and uncertainty? I don't have any easy answers for you on this. I do think that dealing well with risk and uncertainty as a follower of Jesus means that prayer becomes an important part of our lives. We need divine guidance in dealing with the various scenarios that come before us because in many cases they don't lend themselves to easy analysis. I think we need to be vigilant with ourselves with respect to our tendency to either deny risk and uncertainty or catastrophize it. Tempering our own instincts and inviting God's Spirit into our hearts can give us the right perspective in guiding our proper response to life's risks and uncertainties.
