

Health and Wellness Team

In March, the team held a blood pressure clinic after a worship service and conducted a survey of members: "Know Your Medications."



Personal Care Clinics are the primary outreach activity of the team. Volunteers and the Parish Nurse work together to organize and manage the clinics offering foot care, haircuts and massage on a pay-as-you-can basis.

The March 6 clinic was featured by CTV News Kitchener.

A recent survey of clinic participants revealed a high level of satisfaction and appreciation for the services provided.

In April the team is holding its first off-site clinic at Preston Heights Community Center. This increases the potential to reach out to our community.

The next clinic dates to be announced; watch the weekly E News.

The demand for the services at Personal Care Clinics has increased. Foot care services consistently have a waiting list. The Team has submitted another grant application through Western Ontario Waterways to add another six clinics in 2024.

Trillium has already taken some excellent steps to help the environment and we have many ideas for other ways to make our church even "greener". Here are some of the ideas generated at our recent meetings:

- Supporting Sifa and Jackson who are applying to be Climate Motivators with the United Church of Canada again this year
- An earth focused youth-led service for Earth Day
- Hosting a speaker on the problem of single use plastics (April 23)
- Surveying the congregation to determine which actions are of the greatest interest to Trillium members
- Conducting a "Green Audit" to give us a better idea of which actions will give the most benefit for the earth and the best "payback" for the church
- Improving the efficiency of our building by sealing, replacing draughty windows where needed, better thermostats, etc.
- Applying for grants to assist with the cost of our projects
- Possibly enlarging our native plant area, planting additional trees/shrubs, beginning to grow vegetables and using our rain barrels for watering
- Continuing to improve on our composting and recycling practices



Plastic, Plastic Everywhere

Modern day societies have been built on the use of plastics. We have been dependent on plastics for just about everything we use, or wear, and now plastic pollution has become one of the most challenging problems of our time.

The problem is everywhere. It is there in the form of single use plastic bottles that litter our streets and waterways; it is there in tiny particles that break down and are flushed into creeks and rivers and it is there in the form of fishing nets that are cut loose in our oceans and end up trapping birds.

Some reports suggest that plastic pollution is so bad in our oceans that there will come a day when there is more plastic than fish in some of our oceans.

Trillium's Green Team has identified this problem as one that needs to be addressed and the team is organizing a special presentation at the church April 23, at 7 p.m.

Pastor Mark's Musings

Dear Friends,

In 1875, during the pastorate of Rev. James McAllister, with the assistance of Rev. Thomas Leith, a great spiritual awakening took place and there were about sixty or seventy new members added.

These words come from *History of St. Paul's United Church*, 1868-1968 written by Mrs. Hipel. I have spoken about this event from time to time over the past 15 years. There is so much I would like to ask about this pithy little sentence. But first some background.

Methodism, as a Protestant denomination, began back in the 18th century when John Wesley, an Anglican priest, had a spiritual awakening, what he called a "strange warming of the heart." From this awakening Wesley began to take a keen interest in the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. He developed a practice or "method" for eliciting the presence of the Holy Spirit in the lives of believers. This new method included forming small groups of people who would study and pray together to kindle the Spirit's presence in their lives. Thus the term "Methodism" was coined. Initially Wesley saw his work as reforming the rather stale spiritual practices of the Anglican Church but he met considerable resistance from his colleagues and superiors. This caused Wesley to encourage Prayer Societies to form outside of the Established Church. From these Prayer Societies came the new Methodist denomination. It should be noted that the Methodist church grew from a small number of participants in the mid 18th century to becoming, by the mid part of the 19th century, the largest Protestant denomination in the North America.

Methodism was noted for its emphasis on the experience of God and the willingness of its leaders to go where people lived. So began outdoor prayer meetings, revivals and circuit riders (itinerant ministers moving about on horse back from small group to small group.) Methodism in Ontario began to spread out as the land was opened up by new settlers. Methodist Prayer Societies were certainly in existence in Galt, Preston and Hespeler by the 1830s. Zion Methodist Church (one of the three founding congregations of Trillium) was formed in the early 1840s. By the end of the 1850s a

sufficient body of English and German speaking Methodists had gathered in local Prayer Societies in Preston to justify forming a new congregation. Its name, not surprisingly, was Preston Methodist Church.

In 1868 Preston Methodist Church moved into our present building. Then a few years later came the spiritual awakening described above and it is described in the simplest and most matter of fact terms:

In 1875 a great spiritual awakening took place and there were about sixty or seventy new members added.

What was this spiritual awakening? What happened? How did it come about? Who was touched by it? Did people get healed? Were there signs and wonders in evidence? What impact did it have on the Preston community? What did it mean for the church to have 60 or 70 new members added in one year? How did the patterns of church life change with so many new people? Sadly, we will never know more than what Mrs. Hipel wrote in her booklet.

We talk about Awakening the Christ Light in each other and shining it in the world as our basic purpose at Trillium. In essence we are inviting the Holy Spirit to initiate a spiritual awakening at Trillium as dramatic and far reaching as it must have been in 1875. It is important to remember that a growing, thriving, serving community exists only in the midst of a spiritually awakening congregation of dedicated believers. Simply put, a flourishing church lives wherever people, as disciples of Jesus, are willing to allow the Holy Spirit to have its way in them. How is that working for you? Have you given the Holy Spirit a fair chance to wake you up? Have you shown an interest in the spiritual growth of your brother or sister here at Trillium? Are we willing to let a new version of the church breakout at Trillium? It happened a long time ago and it can happen again.
